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

# THE REAL LITTLE BROWN JUG FOOTBALL TROPHY TO BE ON DISPLAY DURING CONVENTION!

Week, July 6-12!

The most famous piece of Red Wing stoneware in existence, the Little Brown Jug became a travelling trophy in 1903 when the University of Michigan football team left it behind after a 6-6 tie when playing at the University of Minnesota. Although Michigan has kept the jug in its possession over the past several years, it returned to Minnesota last September when the Gophers beat the Wolverines 30 to 14.

Earlier this year, RWCS Executive Director Stacy Wegner

secured Ken Magee, author of *The Little Brown Jug: The Michigan-Minnesota Football Rivalry*, to present the keynote presentation at Convention this July. During their conversations, he encouraged Stacy to reach out to Adam Clark, Director of Football Operations at the University of Minnesota, to see if they would allow the RWCS to have the Little Brown Jug on display for his presentation.

"I always thought in the back of my mind that it would be cool to have the jug at Convention, but never thought it would happen!" Stacy says. "Ken came through for us, and working with Adam Clark at the University of Minnesota has been a pleasure."

When Adam Clark made it clear that the University of Minnesota is eager to share the jug with the people of Minnesota, Stacy asked if the Society could display

it for the entire week of Convention and he obliged.

The Pottery Museum of Red Wing will be the main viewing location of the jug, but it will be at Red Wing High School on Thursday, July 9 for Ken Magee's keynote address. It will be on display at the Pottery Museum from Monday, July 6 to Wednesday, July 8, and then again from Friday, July 10 to Sunday, July 12.

"We are excited that the RWCS was able to secure the ability to display the Little Brown Jug during Convention," says Pottery Museum of Red Wing Manager Robin Wipperling. "Showing this iconic Red Wing stoneware jug in Red Wing is a great opportunity for the RWCS, the Pottery Museum of Red Wing and the Red Wing community as a whole."

Magee's keynote presentation is scheduled for Thursday, July 9 at 10:30 a.m. in the Red Wing High School Auditorium. As a special offering for the community, the speech will be open to the public.

in July. Two noteworthy changes this year include the following: Road Construction in Red Wing: That's right, it was bound to happen at some point. ### KidsView & Young Collectors to Learn About the "Famous Jugs of Red Wing"

From the behemoth 70 gallon shoulder jugs to the massive F.A. Morley jug, participants and volunteers will learn all about the "Famous Jugs of Red Wing" at the KidsView and Young Collectors seminars in July. Author Ken Magee will speak to the kids and Young Collectors about the Little Brown Jug football trophy. RWCS Member Dave Hutchson, the son of the last Red Wing Potteries employee, will cover Red Wing's other well-known jugs. KidsView and Young Collectors will then team up for a "Famous Jugs of Red Wing Amazing Race" throughout Red Wing High School on Friday.

Other activities for KidsView participants will include the traditions of "Paint Your Own Plate" with artists from Red Wing Art Reach and "Stamp Your Own Stoneware" with longtime volunteer RWCS Member Mike Robinson. An auction for older kids and a "dump digging" activity for younger kids will also be held. There will also be several Red Wing-related craft projects and "Break the Mold" – a chance to put on goggles and break the molds used to make the 2015 RWCS Commemorative.

The Young Collectors Club will take a field trip to the local Featherstone Pottery, throw on the potter's wheel in the high school art room and perform a play about Red Wing – "O Native Bird, Sing Our Song". See the RWCS website for a full schedule.

According to promotional material located by pottery collector and author Harvey Duke, these Red Wing animal figures were meant to accept flowers, not cigarette ashes as thought by most collectors. From left to right, this "Harmony Sextet" is composed of a fish (#879), elephant (#875), pelican (#880) Scottish terrier (#877), mule (#876) and cat (#878) – each of which was listed as having its own type of singing voice. When you look at this group of animals together with their mouths wide open, can't you almost hear them belting out a tune?



### The Animals of the Harmony Sextet

Marketed by Red Wing as "Flowers Holders" ... not Ash Receivers

Harvey Duke was a meticulous editor, researcher, writer and collector of pottery. In 1994, I had my first conversations with him as he sought more information on Red Wing art pottery for the 8<sup>th</sup> edition of the *Official Price Guide to Pottery and Porcelain* that was published in 1995. At one point, our conversation migrated to the 1939 Red Wing open-mouth figures: the fish, elephant, mule, pelican, cat and dog. I assured him that Red Wing collectors were calling them "ash receivers" despite their small size and the ease with which they might tip over. He took my word for this and carefully listed these figures as such in the 8<sup>th</sup> edition.

During many subsequent conversations over the next several years, Harvey continued to gather and share pottery information as well as ask me multiple questions about the art pottery made in Red Wing. He bombarded me with questions about the availability of pieces, glazes, current prices, pricing changes and questions about the sources (brochures, articles, publications and auction prices) of my information as he made preparations for the 9<sup>th</sup> edition.

In 1999, I visited Harvey in his Brooklyn home. I spent several hours with him talking about pottery as I sat among many, many shelves completely filled with assorted pottery, stacks of pottery-related research papers and numerous pottery books and publications. When he asked me to update prices on various pieces of Red Wing art pottery in 2002, I realized that Harvey had discovered documented information from the Red Wing Potteries about the 1939 animals figures. He also graciously included my input about the incorrect way in which us Red Wing collectors refer to these figures. In the copy

he drafted in the Red Wing section for the 9<sup>th</sup> edition of the *Official Price Guide to Pottery and Porcelain*, he wrote:

FLOWER HOLDERS (1939) Sometimes called ash receivers, these flower holders were marketed as the Harmony Sextet.

Fish (first bass) / 879	150-175
Jumbo Elephant (second bass) / 875	150-175
Mule (second tenor) / 876	150-175
Pelican (second baritone) / 880	150-175
Pussy Cat (first tenor) / 878	185-200
Scotty (first baritone) / 877	185-200

Harvey did not make things up. Clearly he had found proper documentation of the open-mouthed animal figures. I regret, however, that I never thought to ask in subsequent conversations where he found the information.

Over time, our conversations became lengthier, friendlier and more personal as Harvey gave me practical advice when I began writing a manual on a local potter. He had great curiosity. He had a biting sense of humor. Unfortunately he also had health issues. His diabetes was becoming harder and harder to manage and he died from a massive heart attack in 2004 – before he completed the 9th edition of the *Official Price Guide to Pottery and Porcelain*. I continue to miss my friend and I cherish the memory of his tenacity and pursuit to get information correct.

Addendum: The 9<sup>th</sup> edition of the *Official Price Guide to Pottery and Porcelain* was released in 2005 by Joe L. Rosson. In this edition, there is no mention of Harvey Duke or the Harmony Sextet produced by Red Wing Potteries in 1939.

# The Potters Excurs

It seems like whenever a modern-day account retells the story of a historic ship taking to the waters with many passengers on board, it's mired with tragedy and lost lives. But thankfully the Potters Excursion up the Mississippi River from Red Wing to St. Paul included nothing of the sort.

First held by the Stoneware Potters Union in 1912, more than 800 people attended the inaugural Potters Excursion, many of whom were Red Wing Union Stoneware Company employees and their families. According to *Red Wing Potters & Their Wares* by RWCS Hall of Famers Gary & Bonnie Tefft, "The excursions were highly touted events with a prize, in one case a diamond ring, going to the person selling the most tickets." The pottery even recognized the day as a holiday and closed so people could attend.

Described in the June 10, 1915 *Red* Wing Daily Republican as an event that "has received more publicity the past few months than any other date", the 1915 Potters Excursion was a big deal in and around Red Wing. Record attendance was expected on the newly remodeled G.W. Hill steamer, which had a capacity of 2,000 people and featured a 3,600 sq. ft. dance floor and a full orchestra. The recreational event was open to the public and proceeds went to Red Wing's Potters Benefit Association.

The potters who sat on the planning committee in 1915 were O.T. Quinn, George Hehr, Axel V. Anderson, Arthur Johnson, Louis Halenberger and H.M. Schafer. Several newspaper ads led up to the event. According to the ad that ran in the June 10, 1915 *Red Wing Daily Republican*, tickets were 75 cents for adults and 40 cents for children.

In addition to all the newspaper ads, the Red Wing Union Stoneware Company also created several special 1 gallon jugs to promote the outing. Contrary to popular belief, these jugs weren't made as souvenirs. Instead, they were displayed in storefront windows to remind shoppers and pedestrians of the upcoming event and serve as a way to identify the shops where tickets could be purchased. Unfortunately no records are known to exist that state how many Potters Excursion jugs were made.

In addition to being displayed in Ving Collectors Society



storefronts, the excursion planning committee used one of the jugs for a scavenger hunt of sorts. According to the June 15, 1915 *Red Wing Daily Republican*, Potters Excursion jug containing a boardir ticket was "tossed" into the Mississippi River five weeks before the outing at Prescott, WI.

According to the article covering the event in the Friday, June 11, 1915 *Red Win Daily Republican*, the G.W. Hill steamer left Red Wing at 8:27 a.m. with about 700 passengers on board who were looking forward to dancing, playing cards or just enjoying the ride. This amusing paragraph from the article describes the scene:

"'There goes a human cargo of fun and frolic,' said a business man on the levee thi morning as he with scores of others watched the happy crowd waving good-bye to those who were compelled to remain at home. As the boat proceeded up stream scores of young people tripped into a two-step and the day's festivities were in full swing."

About an hour later, the boat stopped

at Diamond Bluff, WI. There it picked up another 61 passengers. More than 200 boarded the boat at Prescott at 11 a.m. and a half hour later nearly 100 "mostly young people" joined the party at Hastings, MN. Picnic lunches were enjoyed at noon.

After being delayed by a barge that was unloading at the pier, the steamer docked at St. Paul at 3:55 p.m. and its 1,064 passengers were given the opportunity to hang out in St. Paul until the boat boarded at 6:30 p.m. It arrived in Hastings at 9:15 p.m., where another 150 people had arrived on the train from Red Wing to join the fun for the "moonlight trip" home. Making record time from St. Paul, the boat landed in Red Wing at 11:30 p.m.

"A merrier crowd never stepped off an excursion steamer than the one last night," read the review in the June 12, 1915 *Red Wing Daily Republican*. "'We had too good a time to be tired,' was the way most of the excursionists expressed it."

Attentive readers are probably wondering if the jug that had been thrown into the river

is still out there, resting in the murky depths of the Mississippi. It was found, however, on June 14, 1915 – three days after the Potters Excursion. According to the June 15, 1915 *Red Wing Daily Republican*, it was found by Chas. L. and C.A. Carlson, who lived near Trudell Slough, which is on the Minnesota side of the river about 3 ½ miles downstream from Prescott.


The article states, "As the prize was picked up too late for the excursion, Rox Nelson, the boatman, substituted five gallons of gasoline and as a prize, took the jug. Rox plans to keep the potters' 1915 outing jug as a souvenir."

Due to their attractiveness, rarity and the fact that they're deeply ingrained in Red Wing history, Potters Excursion jugs are highly sought after. They do come up for sale on occasion, however. The jug pictured at left was for sale in the Pottery Place parking lot during Convention last year and another from the collection of RWCS Charter Member Willie Safe was sold by Hines Auction Service this month (auction occurred after this issue went to print). The last time one sold in the RWCS Convention Auction was 2007; it had a chip and hairline and sold for \$6,750.

### REUNION OF EXCURSION JUGS PLANNED

Longtime RWCS Member Steve Brown is organizing a reunion of the 1915 Potters Excursion jugs for the RWCS Convention this summer and he's asking everyone who owns one of the coveted jugs to bring it to the Display Room at Red Wing High School.

Jugs can be dropped off in the Display Room between noon and 3 p.m. on Wednesday, July 8 by appointment only, or between 8 a.m. and 1 p.m. on Thursday, July 9. They can be picked up between noon and 3 p.m. on Saturday, July 11. Everyone who brings in their jug will be given a packet of historical information about the Potters Excursion as a thanks for participating.



# The Sveden Louise Smorgasbor

Story by RWCS Hall of Famer Larry Roschen

Red Wing collectors know "Sweden House" as the name of a dinnerware pattern. But what do we know about the restaurant that bore this name?

Red Wing books refer to this pattern as "Sweden House", but the correct name is "Sveden House". The restaurant featured a Scandinavian chalet theme and served food smorgasbord

(buffet) style. Swedish meatballs
were a popular item, along
with other standard
buffet offerings. My
family frequently
ate at Sveden
House restaurants
as we traveled
around Minnesota
during my teenage
years. For my
parents, it was an
inexpensive way to fill
the tummies of their six

hungry children.

Definitive information about the Sveden/Sweden House restaurant chain is difficult to find. Newspaper accounts from the era state the first restaurant opened in 1963 in Duluth, MN. Before long, franchises were operating around the country. Here are two newspaper accounts:

Duluth News Tribune, March 23, 1967: "Plans are underway to remodel and expand the Sveden House Restaurant in the Plaza Shopping Center. The Duluth Sveden House was the first of the Sveden House Restaurants, which are now being franchised throughout the United

*Milwaukee Sentinel*, October 11, 1968: "The franchise chain, started in

Red Wing Collectors Society

Duluth in 1963, now has 55 restaurants in 14 states including Massachusetts, California and Florida. The first in the chain outside Minnesota was opened September 1965 in West Allis, Wisconsin." (At this time there were four Sveden House restaurants in the Milwaukee area.)

Judging from the many different interior and exterior designs of the restaurants pictured above and at right, the owners of Sveden House franchises must have been given a lot of leeway in how they operated. Restaurants in Minnesota were named "Sveden House" and they used plates made by Red Wing Potteries (pictured at left). Restaurants in Michigan were also called "Sveden House", but they used plates with a similar design made by Jackson China. Florida and Illinois had "Sweden House" restaurants. Their plates featured a completely different design and were made by Homer Laughlin.

# Restaurant Chain

The Minnesota Sveden House restaurants closed or changed to other names in the early 1970s. Restaurants in the Milwaukee area were open until at least the mid 1970s. The Florida and Illinois restaurants appear to have closed in the late 1970s and early 1980s. The Michigan restaurants were in business until sometime in the mid 2000s. An obituary for Keith Maxwell in the *Grand Rapids Press* (Michigan) dated May 10, 2011 states "Keith and his wife were owners of the Sveden House Smorgasbord for 33 years in Michigan, Ohio and Wisconsin, retiring in 1994 to travel and enjoy life together." Thus it appears that Sveden/Sweden House restaurants remained open for varying lengths of time depending on ownership and location.

have exceptional cobalt decorations. This one sold for \$7,750. The 5 gallon double-handled leaf beehive jug at right was a close second, bringing a strong bid of \$6,250. Red Wing made very few double-handled salt glaze jugs.


